The Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation's core philosophy is grounded in the beliefs of our founders and the family's shared Jewish values that life's purpose is found in service to others. The mission of the Foundation is to enrich humanity by strengthening and empowering children and families in need. In the Jewish tradition of *tzedakah*, the Foundation works to repair the world *(tikkun olam)* alongside those who share our mission.

Tzedakah, derived from the Hebrew language, conveys fairness and justice. This is the closest term to "charity" in Hebrew, and stems from a fundamental belief that donors benefit from philanthropy as much as recipients. More than a financial transaction, philanthropy in the tradition of *tzedakah* builds trusting relationships. The Foundation

is guided by *tzedakah* and driven by a desire to work in partnership with those inside the issues we seek to address.

The Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation was formed in 1955 and endowed following the death of Mr. Fisher in 2005. Together as partners in life, love, family and philanthropy, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher worked side-by-side to create meaningful impact in communities.

Mrs. Fisher was a partner in Mr. Fisher's transformational philanthropy and was known to often encourage him to give more in times of critical need. Beyond their many contributions, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher will long be remembered for their love and commitment to their family, and for truly finding joy in their service with others.

MMFF & OneTable

There is a sacred joy in gathering around the Shabbat dinner table in the setting sun. Candles are lit and prayers and songs fill the room, generations connecting across time. This is the sabbath pause, welcoming loved ones into memory and ritual every Friday at sundown. One Table's Shabbat Project is inviting into tradition many young adults in the Jewish community who have never, or rarely, experienced the warmth of the Shabbat dinner table.

Whether one's Jewish experience is regular temple attendance or fading family photographs, Shabbat dinners promise a stirring connection to history and tradition. Despite widespread feelings of increasing distance from ritual and institution, younger generations still yearn for welcome, joy and community. One Table is ensuring today's young Jewish adults have the chance to encounter this elevated experience.

One of the goals of our Jewish grantmaking is to support people in building a lifelong connection to their Jewish identity and to fellow Jews worldwide. The Foundation partners with OneTable, both in Detroit and Palm Beach, Florida, by funding the salaries of OneTable facilitators who work directly with potential hosts to plan and organize Friday night Shabbat dinners. Already enmeshed in their local Jewish communities, these local ambassadors connect hosts and guests and help link Shabbat guests with deeper engagement opportunities.

For many of OneTable's young adult participants, this is their very first time hosting, or even sitting for a traditional Shabbat meal. However, everything is explained and made accessible, from online ritual guides outlining when to light candles and how to make kiddush (blessing) over wine


to challah recipes and conversation starters. Facilitators ensure dinner guests have the details they need to assemble in comfort. Hosts choose their overall menu, the number of people they can welcome and the theme for their meal. "Nourishment" funding for food purchase is also available, making hosting Shabbat dinners available to all.

OneTable's welcome is open-armed and inclusive, with specialized guides for hosting Shabbat dinners adapted for guests of many experiences and cultures, from Pride to Latinx. Dinners are designed to meet the individualized needs of particular communities, from fully sober dinners to vegan menus. Accessibility is always prioritized, including virtual dinner gatherings during the pandemic.

Since the Foundation's Detroit-based partnership with OneTable began in 2019, local participation has exploded, with more than 200 Shabbat dinners attended by over 500 unique individuals, in 2021 alone. OneTable's activities in Metro Detroit have continued to grow its in-person and virtual host participant numbers each year.

According to Fisher Foundation Program Partner Lisa Soble Siegmann, this work "sets the stage for what can unfold in the future. It is a starting point for Jewish engagement, helping young Jewish people become stronger friends, parents, partners and community leaders."

Encouraging young adults to disconnect from the world and instead connect with each other, OneTable offers an entry point for many participants to begin – or begin again – their own Jewish journeys. Genuine connections are made – to faith, ritual and to generations before and still to come.



This partnership is unique, because this program is proactive and OneTable takes a targeted approach. Their impact is focused. Shabbat is a starting point for lifelong Jewish engagement. OneTable is helping reach young Jews and develop their individualized Jewish journeys.




The Foundation works with partners and leaders to provide for the needs of and ensure the ongoing vitality, success, and well-being of the Jewish People.

GRANTMAKING IMPACT AREA: JEWISH



MMFF & Development Centers, Inc.

Imagine a space for children that is warm, soothing, designed to meet their individual needs, and developed in consultation with the community families it intends to serve. In Detroit, this space is the Northrop Early Childhood Development Center, one of the city's first facilities specifically designed for early childhood education.

For the Northrop Center's renovations, community input and child-centered design were foundational. From soft paint colors and new windows connecting children with nature to its play structures and thoughtful layout, it is a space transformed. This evolution – from a vacant building in Brightmoor into an early childhood educational and resource center for families – is the fruit of a remarkable community partnership. Development Director Sally Bond is "most proud that the Center was designed using input from local families."

Today, parents and caregivers feel welcome and safe as they enter the building, understanding from its intentional design that they and their children are valued. Open indoor play spaces and new bathrooms attached to classrooms help children work on self-regulation, healing and academic growth. Parents are also invited to seek support for employment, housing and basic needs via a dedicated resource room.

For more than a decade, the Foundation has been proud to work in collaboration with Development Centers Inc. (DCI) on this and other projects. Building on its ongoing financial support for the Center's transformation, the Foundation has shared its insights throughout all phases of the renovation, from planning to implementation.

A long-time neighborhood partner in Brightmoor, the Foundation understood that honoring the autonomy, individuality and dignity of the Center's students and their families would be essential for a successful collaboration. To properly support young children with unique development needs and the adult caregivers and teachers working to meet those needs, the Foundation had to lead with respect and trust in the experience of families and staff.

Building on its years-long relationship with DCI, the Foundation, like other funders, realized that the pandemic necessitated a parameter shift to better serve grant partners and their distinct, evolving needs. Adjustments were made to adapt to crisis conditions created by COVID and the surrounding pandemic response. The Foundation's support for DCI – and other grant partners – took on new forms to meet the current moment including timeline extensions, emergency holiday support for DCI families, and overall capacity building.

This evolution was shaped by mutual respect and understanding. The Foundation offered early childhood education funding insights and DCI shared its expertise born of many years working in community with Brightmoor families. The trust embedded within this partnership encouraged DCI to openly and honestly present its needs, ideas and experiences and invite the Foundation to listen, learn and respond.

Considering Detroit's lack of childcare facilities as well as the prohibitive costs of new construction, DCI was eager to acquire the Northrop Street building when it became available.





This represents a true partnership over many years. We have walked alongside DCI throughout the renovation process, providing creative support for the unique, evolving needs of the center and its families.

Once the building was purchased, its renovation work offered ongoing challenges to DCI in the early phase of the project. With the help of the Illinois Finance Fund (IFF), the project was separated into distinct, more manageable phases. During that time, DCI gathered resources from additional funders, including the Foundation.


Today, DCI's Northrop Early Childhood Center is a welcoming, full-spectrum early childhood education facility providing resources for young children and their families. Trusting DCI's experience and wisdom, the Fisher Foundation looks forward to a continued partnership of learning and growth.

The Foundation works with partners and leaders to provide children ages 0 to 8 and their families the opportunity to access and engage with high quality early childhood development resources that meet their needs, leading to success in school and throughout life.

Together with our partners, The Foundation's work will lead to:

Alignment through artistic expression and shared joy in partnership. This is the exceptional relationship the Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation and the College for Creative Studies (CCS) have built in Detroit's Brightmoor neighborhood. Over more than a decade, the Foundation and CCS have worked together to grow the school's Community Arts Partnership (CAP) for Brightmoor's youth, their families and the greater community.

In 2011, the Foundation began its partnership with CCS in Brightmoor, taking over and even expanding arts and youth development programs once led by a departing funder. Starting with its initial Brightmoor Neighborhood Arts grant, the Foundation combined programming into a unified, progressive arts and development pathway for local residents.

Over time, programming evolved to serve students from kindergarten age through young adulthood, while linking advancing young artists to educational and summer employment opportunities in the arts. Young people seeking additional talent development can even join the CCS youth leadership council (YLC) which, according to program participant Dominic Porter, provides opportunities to "build many connections with other artists and do amazing projects." He also notes, "It is a good opportunity for teens that want to take the arts seriously and have a passion for bettering their community at a young age. It's really cool to be able to use my art as a means to benefit others."

The CCS Student Art Leaders program also serves entrepreneurial students interested in year-round work. Additionally, CCS and the Foundation support credit-granting pre-college programs and CCS-specific undergraduate scholarships.

CCS is both a national art school leader and an intentional supporter of its community. It provides its Brightmoor students full access to the same level of professional instruction and industry-standard materials and resources that its student body in its Midtown Detroit headquarters receives. Students have access to high-quality instruction and support, through step-by-step educational courses. Relationships are built, allowing each student, as participant Matthew Cole says, "to grow as an artist and as a person...while receiving true guidance in the art world."

While helping provide a launching pad for arts careers is important, the Foundation primarily funds this work to make art accessible, and to help young people enjoy creative expression and receive high-quality arts instruction. The joy of creating art, with professional resources easily at hand, is something every child should experience.

Beyond artistic endeavors, both organizations are dedicated to ensuring young people receive the social and emotional learning opportunities they deserve. CCS's programming is intended to promote positive relationship-building with peers and adult mentors, instill feelings of safety and acceptance, and encourage youth to feel free to imagine, discover and express themselves through art.



The College for Creative Studies and the Foundation have partnered together for such a long period of time because our missions and values deeply align. We've worked tirelessly to support a partnership that values trust in one another. We also share a commitment to providing young people with exceptional arts experiences. The team at CCS makes this work possible by giving youth the access and education that they fundamentally deserve.

MMFF & ISAIC

Partnerships that birth and sustain relationships, develop skills and help grow new business ventures are at the heart of the Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation's impact investing portfolio. Detroit's Industrial Sewing and Innovation Center (ISAIC) is one of these essential forimpact organizations.

A local and national resource for sustainable garment production and industrial sewing work, ISAIC offers enriching training opportunities that prepare individuals to grow in specialized manufacturing roles for multiple industries. While elevating skill development and economic mobility, ISAIC also retains its focus on technologies that benefit the community and reduce environmental impact. In partnership with Carhartt, it brought industrial sewing back to Detroit. ISAIC also supplies talent to support the city's growing apparel manufacturing industry.

ISAIC's training begins with introductory coursework, followed by a year-long paid apprenticeship with fully funded benefits and simultaneously accompanied by advanced skill development. According to Yolanda Brown, who completed her internship at ISAIC, the center offers "freedom and range to do what you want and learn what you want...to gain transferable skills...if I did decide to get another job, I would be attractive to employers. I [also] want to do all aspects of manufacturing to start my own company."

As ISAIC grows, so does its influence across the country, from sharing its standardized Fundamentals of Industrial Sewing and Production (FISP) curriculum to consultation and tech support for factories. In 2023, ISAIC will kick off

its Worker-Owned Factory Incubation Program to teach its employees sustainable manufacturing business practices. The program also includes both training in business finance and profit-sharing from concurrent manufacturing work for various brands.

This expanding influence is possible in part because of ISAIC's shared and deepening partnership with the Foundation. Now in its third year, this collaboration is enabling ISAIC to grow and efficiently run its business operations with credit instead of easily available cash flow, just as other young commercial enterprises do.

The Foundation's investment provided a revolving line of credit to fund the center's materials and equipment procurement, its staff expansion and its ability to work on orders as soon as they are received. Access to growth capital allowed ISAIC to expand its capacity and continue innovating, while simultaneously building up the school itself, its creditworthiness and its credibility with program funders.

This unique and mutually respectful partnership has encouraged ISAIC to communicate frequently with the Foundation about multiple issues and supports their ability to be positive, responsive partners to their own community and clientele. When opportunities appear, ISAIC is now equipped to quickly respond with creative and marketable ideas to sustain its existence. During the pandemic, it pivoted to personal protection equipment (PPE) production, while the Foundation's funding kept its training programs going.



ISAIC has helped bring industrial sewing back to Detroit and offers impressive skill development opportunities which individuals can then take with them to other jobs.

Our partnership provided the support ISAIC needed but couldn't get anywhere else, including a unique deal structure and working capital as they grew.




The Foundation works with partners and leaders to ensure organizations focused on social and environmental impact have access to growth capital to expand innovation and grow organizational capacity and sustainability.

- Align Foundation assets to further our mission and increase impact.


GRANTMAKING IMPACT AREA: IMPACT INVESTING

MMFF & Wellspring

As generations of the Fisher family have found joy in their service with others, today's Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation enthusiastically supports organizations embracing transformational philanthropy. A standout among these is the teen philanthropy work conducted by Wellspring, a youth development organization that has partnered with neighbors in Brightmoor for three decades and counting.

Over time, the Foundation's partnership with Wellspring has included support for summer employment for local teens and young adults, staff development via Supporting Brightmoor Leaders, as well as the organization's Kumon literacy development work. In 2019, the Foundation suggested Wellspring create its own teen philanthropy program and offered funding to support its development.

Since then, several of Wellspring's Teen Council members have embraced the opportunity to create – and fund – substantial projects to benefit their community. They studied the challenges their own neighbors faced and researched local organizations working to address many of these challenges. They also learned the ins and outs of philanthropy, particularly the complexities of the grantmaking process.

Just as Max and Marjorie once did, these young men and women worked side-by-side to create meaningful impact for their neighbors. Along the way, they studied communityled giving and then used this newfound knowledge to design and implement their own grant processes.

Working in collaboration, students used surveys and old-fashioned door-knocking to identify community needs. After creating grant applications, they met with applicants, carefully reviewed submissions, sought applicant feedback and wrote grant reports. Their hard work and responsible stewardship are the genuine work of informed philanthropy. It also reflects their dedication to advancing justice and equity for their neighbors in Brightmoor. This too is a commitment fully shared by the Foundation.

Most importantly, the students' work resulted in actual grantmaking support for community organizations focused on financial literacy and mental health. They identified these grant priorities themselves, based upon their own attentive, in-person studies. Some of the organizations they chose to support offer resources for grandparents parenting their grandchildren, teenage mothers, and youth dealing with devastating loss.

According to Peter Lisiecki, Wellspring's Youth Development Specialist, for the teens themselves, the program led to growth in "social-emotional skills, including self-awareness, self-management and decision-making...as well as improvements in their communication skills, ability to work within a team and their understanding and empathy for others."

In addition, participating students earned scholarship funding and direct compensation for their time and work. The Foundation also adjusted its support to give students the ability to increase grant awards and to streamline the application process. At the same time, the Foundation benefitted from the young philanthropists' work, learning about new partners from a broader span of ages and generations in Brightmoor.



An essential thought partner to the Foundation in Brightmoor, Wellspring's robust teen leadership program builds self-confidence and self-efficacy and is a powerful tool for youth to learn about philanthropy, leadership, issues facing families in Brightmoor, and grassroots community giving.
